Frohe Weihnachten und ein gutes neues Jahr! We try to speak German a lot at home and we are starting to learn a few phrases and use them, so I'll probably always include one or two in the newsletter. I'm sure you can guess the translation of that one. One of my New Years resolutions is to read the Book of Mormon in German because Thomas S. Monson said that if you will read the Book of Mormon in a language, you will become fluent in it. It is my very great desire to become fluent in German so I'm going to try it. I'm sure that it will be slow going at first, with a lot of checking the dictionary and doing it side-by-side with the English one but I'm sure that it will be worth it.



We had a great vacation just before Christmas, skiing in the Alps. We weren't sure we were going to be

able to get there at first, because it snowed so much the day we left that it was hard to get to church. It was our yearly Sacrament meeting with the Germans and they don't cancel church for anything, but if it hadn't been for that I'm sure that church would have been canceled. By the time we got ready to go that afternoon the Autobahn was cleared off enough and we had no trouble getting there. It snowed the first couple of days we were there, but then the sun came out and the temperature dropped, but it was beautiful. We all took lessons except Greg. Rich took snowboarding lessons, Amy and I were in the same beginning ski class, Brianna had her own beginning ski class, and Jeff was in a class called "ski kids." They learned to ski too, but they did a lot of playing in the snow and took it quite a bit slower than the other classes. We spent the first day just getting comfortable on skis which meant walking up a small hill on skis, skiing

down about 100 feet, then doing it all again. If you have ever walked up a hill on skis, you can imagine how frustrated and tired we were after the first day. It was necessary, though, because they don't have chair lifts there at Chiemsee, only a T-bar, so you have to be able to stay on your skis all the way up the mountain. We were able to go up the T-bar the second day, and by the third day we went all the way to the top of the Germany side. From there you can go over into Austria where they do have chair lifts and much more challenging runs, but as rank beginners, we didn't do that. Greg could have, but the ticket was about twice the cost and he chose to stay with us and take pictures. The runs were good for us, long gentle runs that took about 20 minutes to get up on the T-bar and about 10 minutes to get down. We ate lunch every day at the German ski lodge. The Germans haven't heard that you should charge outrageous prices for food at ski lodges, so we got really good food at reasonable prices. I got much better at ordering food in German, too. We stayed in the Lake hotel, a hotel that Hitler had built during WWII and taken over by the Americans afterward. It was a really nice hotel and the room was big enough for the whole family, which is a feature that is hard to find in Germany, I hear. We were able to go to dinner one night in a small village near the hotel which was another adventure in figuring out what to order and ordering in German. Our friends, the Laus, a family that is over here working for Daimler-Chrysler, went with us and they all speak quite a bit of German so they helped us order something other than Bratwurst or Schnitzel. I did order for myself, though, which they encourage us to do because they know that we are trying to learn the language.

We had a very nice, peaceful Christmas, one of the most peaceful I remember for a while. I didn't try to sew anything or do anything spectacular and I think that it was a much nicer Christmas as a result. Greg hasn't really had to go back to work yet because they

do a day on, day off schedule during Christmas here and the day he was supposed to work there was a big snow storm and they sent everyone who didn't live on Patch Barracks home early.

We had another big storm here on Sunday. It was the biggest wind storm in Europe this century. About 100 people were killed when trees were blown down all over Europe. It took about 3 hours for us to get home from church, which usually take us about 20 minutes, because they had to reroute traffic on the Autobahn. There's so much traffic on the Autobahn that when there is any disruption at all you can have a huge traffic jam that is called a Stau which has a definition all it's own. Traffic can literally stop for hours and people get out of their cars and set up chairs or walk up and down the road talking to other people. We haven't had too much experience with it yet, but you can't really avoid it because there is really no rhyme or reason, like rush hour. It can happen any time.

We are really having a good time here and are becoming more comfortable all the time. We feel so blessed to be here, happy and healthy, and we pray that the new year will find all of you the same.

The Myth of the Perfect Mother by Agnes Palmer - Redbook, Apr. '61

There is no doubt that children are not always enjoyable 24 hours a day. The eight-year-old who acts as if he is being persecuted because you ask him to take the garbage out doesn't make you feel like breaking into song.

But the enjoyment of children is not a luxury or a by-product of parenthood. It is the very core of it. Parents often are so concerned with training and teaching and correcting and protecting children that they lose the capacity for simply marveling at them, for responding to the wondrous miracle of their growth as it unfolds. A scrubbed little girl in a party dress or a dirty little boy in a baseball uniform, a proud fourth grader with a B on his spelling test or a crestfallen one with a B on hers are not merely serious responsibilities. They are a great and glorious, if not unadulterated, delight - and finding them so will make them more so.
