Some observations and highlights:

 The living conditions are way lower than we're accustomed to. Most homes are tiny, and are built of cinder block because the bugs and moisture and hurricanes destroy wood homes too easily. Home-owner's insurance costs more than a home and property put together, so, if a hurricane hits, buildings are usually just abandoned because the owners don't have enough money for repairs. Here's a picture of a place on St. Thomas that was hit by a hurricane 5 years ago, and a tourist shop on Barbados that was just hit by Hurricane Ivan this year.



- The weather was mostly mild except for the day we hit a "tropical storm" on St. Marteen and could hardly walk! On the beach of St. Lucia, Greg got sunburned wearing 50 SPF sunscreen, so we spent a lot of our time doing driving tours and shopping!
- On Antigua (pronounced An tee ga), we had a really great taxi driver who gave us a five-hour tour of the island. When we asked about the religions on the island, he listed about six or eight and then said, "We even have The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints". We had a great talk and encouraged him to let "those boys who was alwus lookin' for some way to help" teach his family. Antigua didn't become independent of British Commonwealth until 1981! The taxi driver was so excited about their new gov'ment and all the things it was doing for the people. They really have a strong belief in family and spend huge efforts teaching children. Every school has uniforms and every child graduates from high school. After graduation, every child either goes to college or learns a trade. They hang people for murder

and whip people for minor offenses (including saying the f-word). The island only had <u>one</u> crime last year! I hope they can survive and thrive with their independence!

On Barbados we became official "Atlantis Submariners". We de-barked ship early, spent big bucks, and had an adventure of a lifetime! It was so cool to see the submarine slowly rise out of the water, blow the water out of all its ballasts like a giant whale, and then open up for its passengers. We were early enough in the day that the sub was only filled to about 20% capacity so we got to switch sides and look out lots of portholes. We "experienced the magical world of the Caribbean reef with coral formation, sponge gardens, colorful fish, exotic marine life, and an imposing shipwreck, the Lord Willoughby". Wow! It was way cool!!!
