About a month ago we were traveling from Saratoga Springs to our apartment in Salt Lake in the evening after dark. We were traveling on the freeway in the HOV lane (that's the way inside lane) in the green Plymouth minivan. All of a sudden we lost all power in the engine.

The engine was dead and wouldn't start. In addition to the HOV lane there were four more lanes between us and the shoulder where cars in trouble can stop. Talk about a tender mercy – I was able to get in between cars across each of the four lanes and get to the outside. All this while coasting and the car slowing down pretty drastically. We stopped right by a freeway entrance so there was a "Y" shape with dirt in the middle. It was there where we hovered with cars zooming by on both sides. We waited a few minutes hoping a patrolman would come by and help us. No-one did so we called the Highway patrol and finally 911 on our cell phone. After a time, a patrolman showed up and called a tow truck. But, two things – we would have no way to get home – we couldn't ride with the patrolman, and the tow-truck driver wasn't about to let us ride with him. *And*, we had to pay the tow-truck driver – **up front – in cash** – no plastic – no check! \$121.00!!! And we didn't have more than about \$20 in our pockets. The patrolman was very nice and understanding

but said this is standard procedure.

Well, what to do? It was almost 9:00 - closing time at the library. But we took a chance and called and reached the secretary – who was just leaving. She gave us the phone number of our Zone Leader. He and his wife were just walking in from shopping. They came to provide us transportation home. When they got there and we mentioned the money problem, Elder Pryde (the ZL) pulled out his wallet and reached in the back corner produced a neatly folded one hundred dollar bill – the exact amount we needed when combined with what we had in our wallet. Guess what? I now have a hundred dollar bill folded in the back of *my* wallet!

What a bunch of tender mercies all piled together! We really felt we were blessed that night. Cars. What a pain. We have to have them in our society. But they are a pain to buy, pay for, insure, keep up, and avoid crashing them.
