We hope all is well with everyone else and if anyone is in the area, please do not hesitate to visit! We love and miss you all!



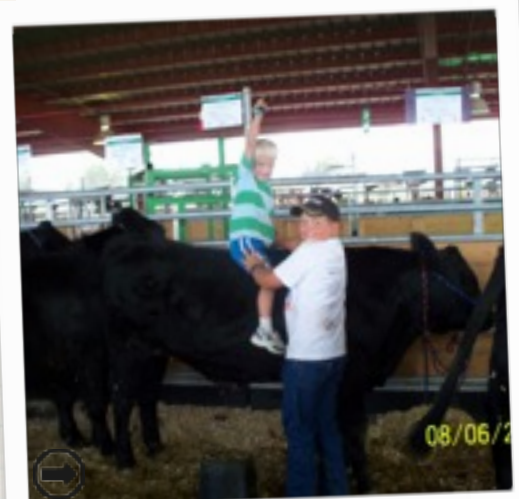
THE SORENSENS

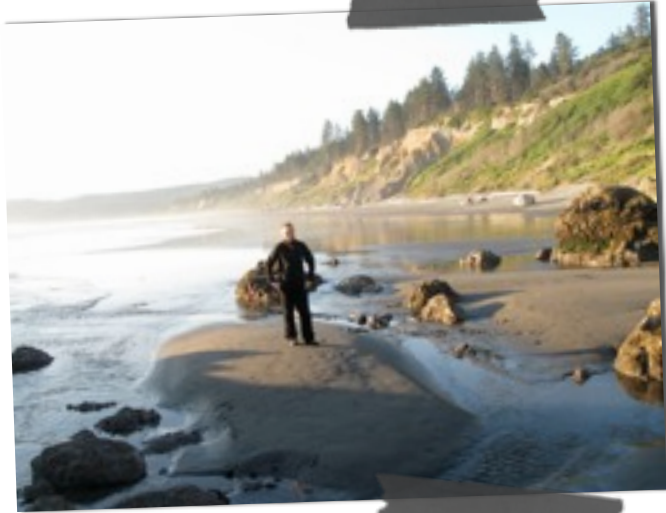

Hello From Idaho

It is sure good to be back in Idaho. Once again I spent a good chunk of the summer 13 June - 27 July at Fort Lewis Washington training cadets. My days started by waking up at 3:30 AM and heading out to the woods where I would pick up a group of cadets and take them on six two hour missions walking through the woods. At the end of the day we would finish up reports and get back to the motel at about 8:00 PM; get something to eat and go to bed and do it all again the next day. Needless to say that was getting old. While I was gone Leslie kept the place going by gardening and taking care of the lawn. With our wet spring our flowers and our lawn are green and growing wild. We decided to try square foot gardening this year, so before I left we built eight boxes out of railroad ties and put them in our already existing garden space. It was pretty cold up here all through June so we are pretty far behind, but it looks like we'll have a good harvest. She also kept busy with her callings and her friends and the gym. She is a den leader for the Bears and teaches the 12 year-olds in Sunday School.

Once LDAC was over Leslie came up and we had a great vacation. We spent most of our time in Forks, Washington chasing vampires and werewolves. It is a great little town right on the edge of the Olympic National Forest. We hiked 20 miles in the rain forest one day and checked out the tidal pools at low tide the next day. The area we were in gets fifteen feet of rain each year so it was sure green. Now that we are back home we have been wildly trying to get all of the raspberries harvested and house repairs completed.

Our missionaries are both doing very well. Jeff finally got out of the Dominican MTC and out into the field in mid July. He is loving it but it is not easy. The mission had been experiencing a lot of problems just prior to him getting there. He came in just shortly after they got a new mission president and they are working very hard to get things back on track. Jeff is in a very small town way out in the country close to the Haitian border. The people there are extremely poor and water and power are very tenuous. They don't eat with the members because disease is very common and they are too poor to share what little they have anyway. They can't really keep food at their apartment because they don't have power most

days, but he is grateful that there is power most nights because they need the fan to sleep. You can also imagine that all his showers are cold, but that's okay because it is really hot. The toilet and sink in his bathroom don't work, but that's okay because if the water goes out they just go get buckets at a tank and they need them to flush the toilet anyway; you can't drink the water, they have to buy all their drinking water. He says that some elders might complain and wish they could be in the nice larger areas like Santa Domingo but he loves it there. He says that no matter how bad it gets it is so much easier than wandering through the Arizona desert with meager supplies in a home made back pack that he can put it all in

perspective. He says that he is loving life right now and feeling the spirit and he's really thankful for that.

Brianna has also moved out into a more rural area of New Mexico to Placitas. The other day she sent us a picture of a bobcat just sitting on their patio. They live with a family in their house and they are a trio right now so it's pretty tight, but she gets along really well with both of them and they are really doing well there. She said that one week they got two new investigators and she was pretty excited. We were excited for her, realizing that the work in the States is much slower than in countries like the Dominican Republic. They work a lot with less actives and they have some new converts that

they are working with and love a lot. She is also happy and doing well.

We just got some good news from Rich. We thought he was going back to Afghanistan in October but it looks like the troop draw down has canceled his Unit's deployment so he will be staying at Fort Lewis Washington for another year. He likes it there a lot. Of course he had only been there for the relatively dry summer. We will see what he says about the place after the eight strait months of rain start in October.

Amy and Tyler are doing great. Amy is working while Tyler is finishing up his degree. By this time next year he is hoping to apply to Occupational Therapy School.

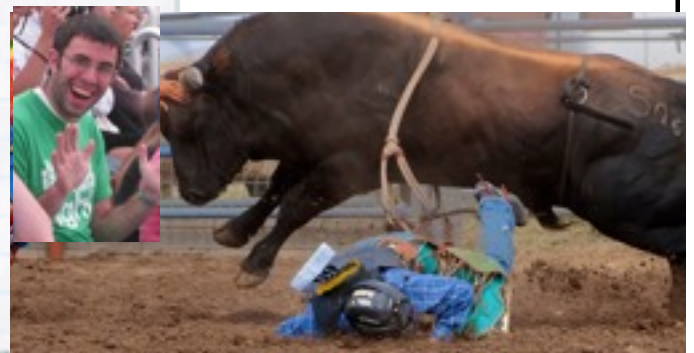
Wow! Have We Changed!
