Lawson & Kelly:



Several days after we got back, I (Greg) headed out for Turkey with my boss (General Salisbury) and five colonels. That trip was not nearly as fun. Since I was the lowest ranking guy, I had to make all of the arrangements and keep everything on schedule. After two days of continuous meetings and briefings I was more than ready to come home.

LESLIE - Greg always has to throw in a comment or two about the wildlife. He asked the tour guide at the archeological site about the local wildlife and when she didn't know anything, he asked a guy in a cafe at the gorge. They talked for about 20 minutes and were having one of those "outdoor guy talks" that I have seen Greg have with people in every country we've been to. It's good to know you can count on some things.

We all had a great time in Crete, but I also had an opportunity to go to Poland the weekend before we left. It was a shopping trip that people take from time to time to the pottery factories up there. We met at Patch Barracks (the main Army facility here in Stuttgart) at 9.30 pm and got on a bus and drove all night. It is about a 6 or 7 hour drive if you go straight through, but we stopped a couple of times and then had to wait at the border for a couple of hours. I don't know if that is because it was night or because of mad cow or hoof and mouth or what, but they did tell us not to bring any meat on the trip. We got to the first store at about 6:00 in the morning and the people were more than happy to open their doors for a busicad of American women. They were certainly justified too, because those women went crazy. You can get some Polish pottery at the bazaars around here but if you go up there you can get it at great prices. I got a beautiful round platter just like the one that a friend of mine showed me in a catalog from the states for about \$200. I bought mine for about \$20. Even so, I didn't go crazy because I was a little overwhelmed when I saw some of these women spend \$400-\$500 at one store. I did find some Christmas dishes that I loved and since I have always wanted some, I got a whole set.

It was a real eye-opener to go to a former east-block country. Its true that Germans have most of the money in Europe, but even so I didn't expect quite the contrast that I saw just going over the border. It even smells different, which I found was because they burn a high-sulfur content coal up there. Even the graffiti looked different, and I've seen graffiti in 3 or 4 different countries over here. It usually looks kind of artistic, especially all over the trains in Italy, but there it was just dirty black scrawls in a language with j's and z's in weird places. We saw a few boys sniffing paint or glue right on the side of the road and at every place we stopped there were boys just waiting to carry your packages for a dellar or two. I know that there are beautiful and interesting places to go in Poland, but this probably wasn't one.

As for news of the news of the family, time is rushing by and nothing seems to be able to slow it down. I registered Rich for his senior year the other day and I can't believe it! He is planning to take 3 AP classes next year. He is getting ready to take the SAT on Saturday. He took the PSAT a few months ago and he must have gotten brochures from 40 or 50 colleges since then. He is doing very well in school, still on the honor roll and has been invited to join the National Honor Society. (He was invited to join last year but didn't get his paper work in on time.) He is still playing secrer although he hasn't had time lately because he has been writing his 20 page term paper for honors English. Amy is also playing soccer in addition to being the freshman class president, National Junior Honor Society secretary, and keeping her grades up. She was this close to a 4.0 this last quarter. Hi Everybody! The world travelers are finally back home. Les and the kids had their Spring Break 7-15 April so we decided that being here in Europe we better get out and do something. Last year we went to Italy with Grandma and Grandpa (Wilson). That was a great trip but unfortunately it didn't turn Grandpa into an Italian gournet. He only survived on the Breakfast he got every morning in the Camp Darby Army Mess Hall. This year the weather has been a little dreary for about the last eight months so we decided to go somewhere warm if we could. I pulled out the map of U.S. military installations in Europe and noticed we have a small Naval Air Station on the Greek Island of Crete. I called the flight operation folks at Ramstein Air Base about two hours north of Stuttgart to see if they had any flights scheduled to go there. As it turned out they had several going and coming back so we decided to try and go. The way it works is you show up with your leave papers about two hours before the plane leaves and if they have extra space you can fly. Once you get to your destination then the real fun begins as you try and find a flight back. Luckily for us all that went pretty smoothly this time.

The first day we got to Crete we saw more sun that we had seen the last six months combined in Germany. Some other folks from the ward went so we sort of linked up with them once we got there. The Navy folks had recommended a place for us to stay on the beach but when we went it was really small and expensive. After we looked at it we were trying to decide if we should take it when the other folks came by and told us they had found a better place. The place we ended up staying was a small apartment with two bedrooms one bathroom and a small kitchen and two balconies, one of which faced the ocean. It was very nice so we stayed there the whole week.

Crete is a very big island with poor roads so we realized right off the bat that we wouldn't have time to do much so we just picked a few things. We spent several days on the beaches, the water was cold but you could swim if you were determined enough. We had a few rain showers but nothing serious. We spent one day going to the oldest ruins in Europe from the Minoan civilization. After we saw the ruins we went to a museum where we saw some artifacts from about 4000 BC and listened to Amy say, "Can we go yet?" as she paced the floor. On another day we went up in the mountains to see the largest gorge in Europe. It is about 10 miles long, you can hike through it from the mountains to the ocean but they weren't letting anyone go through it that day because of a flash flood threat. They have some big wild goats in the area but we didn't see any that day.

The place was very nice but somewhat trashy and unkempt. We remarked that if you could move all of the Greeks out and replace them with Germans the place would be spotless. It was beautiful, anyway. You wouldn't want to let any of the locals hear you say that because during WWII the Germans conducted an airborne invasion and held Crete for most of the war. They are still pretty upset about that; the war museum went into it in great detail calling the Germans all kinds of bad names, etc. Their worst hard feelings of course are toward the Turks. The Turks controlled Crete for some time before the Greeks won a major battle and kicked them out in 1912. The museum called them demons in some displays.

One day we went to the nearest city (Chania) and saw a war museum and did a little shopping and hit a nice restaurant with not that great of food. The food down there was different. The famous Gyro (lamb, goat etc.) wrapped in fresh pita bread with the special sour cream and yogurt, sauce was good the first time around but got old fast. Greek pizza was different, I think it was made out of goat cheese. The baklava was good for one taste but I can't hang with it for more than one or two small bites. The great thing we did find to eat was oranges. They grow tons of them and they were right in the middle of the harvest. They sold them everywhere including the roadsides. On one occasion we found some guys with a pickup truck completely overloaded with a blown tire. We stopped and got a big bad full for about a dollar. Whenever you would stop to get some they would weigh your bag and if you have 2.1 kilograms they would start shoving more in until they rounded you up another kilo. They were all more than happy to take dollars but we exchanged money at the banks so we knew what rate we were getting.

When we left Crete the sun was shinning and when we got back to Germany it had just stopped snowing. We have had one nice afternoon since we have been back.

We're also having "Cabs" during the week. This week they came to our house and I demonstrated different filing systems. I had several notebook filing styles as well as the four-color folder-box system I use. We had 10 people over on Thursday and 2 on Friday. Again, they seemed to really get a lot out of it. Next week we'll be going to the Family History Center to start using PAF. Cawson has arranged for me to borrow a projector, so every Sunday I show them a WP Presentations slide show made to demonstrate whatever I'm teaching. I can show them PAF and rell them how to use it but they can't really learn without doing-so we're going to do it together at the FHC. Thanks, Carry for going with me that first time. I'm still working there every Friday and enjoying it. We have a big-screen TV hooked to one of the computers, so I can demonstrate and they can practice it on their computer! Great!!!!


